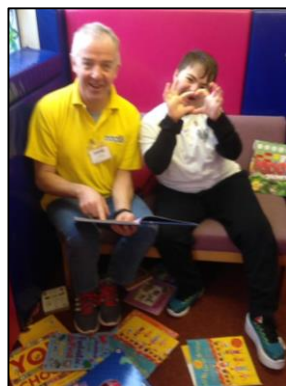

for work experience for young people over the age of 12, and potential employment with PACSO as a casual playworker. Volunteers have a fantastic time with our PACSO members and their siblings, and can learn so many new skills. Thank you to all our volunteers – you know who you are!!

One of our volunteers, Stephen, tells us in his own words why he started volunteering with PACSO:

It was my 50th birthday, I had just given my 50th pint of blood, and I decided to have a big party to celebrate my achievement, highlighting blood and organ donation! So I thought let's raise some money for charity!

I decided to choose Help the Heroes, The Teenage Cancer Trust, and a local one. I asked a friend, Pat O'Hanlon and he suggested PACSO. It was a phenomenal success! 150 people, black tie, singers, band, disco, and lots of cash! £1,250 each to The Teenage Cancer Trust and Help the Heroes. By then PACSO had won my heart and we gave them the remaining £3500! (I wish I had given it all to PACSO!)



That was 3 years ago and since then I have arranged another ball and raised even more money. It feels so good to give PACSO, bags of money (what Val does with it I don't know!) everybody should do it!

Why does Stephen give up his time to volunteer for PACSO?

It's about returning time that people gave to me when I was a boy, giving something back to the community. I get a sense of wellbeing, and it's important to show my 12 year old son this is what you do in life.

In giving, you receive. It is fun being with inspiring children and Emma and the other team members, I enjoy organising events, it's something to look forward to, and look back on, it gives one a sense of achievement.

*Its great working with such a dedicated team, I lead a busy life!
